Step 3: Reading

Read the text below and check your answers to the previous task.

The first Earth Hour event was held on 31 March 2007 in Sydney, Australia. It is held every year on the second-to-last or last Saturday of March from 20.30 to 21.30 hours. Do you know why it is held in late March? This is when the sunset times match in the north and the south hemisphere, and so the 'lights out' event looks even more beautiful. Earth Hour is more than an annual event – it is the symbol of a bigger promise toward nature and our planet. The Earth Hour '60' logo stands for the 60 minutes of Earth Hour where we focus on the impact we are having on our planet and take positive action to address the environmental issues we face. In 2011, the '60+' logo was introduced standing for a duty to a continue the positive acts for the planet even after the 60 minutes and all through the year. Earth Hour is an event for anyone and everyone who wants to help make our planet – and our future - better.





The lines in the video are written in a style of poetry called **Free Verse**. Complete the description of free verse using the words given below.




Step 11: Write your own Free Verse
